In the news this week

Sight loss charity, The Guide Dogs for the Blind Association, has launched an appeal for volunteers to help raise and foster guide > Have you seen a guide dog? How did dogs. Guide dog users rely on their companions for help inside and outside the home, and for many, for their independence. In a recent documentary shown on the BBC, journalist Sean Dilley told of his relationship with his guide dog, Sammy, who recently retired. After the programme aired, the charity had close to 5,000 people stepping forward to volunteer. Before the Covid 19 pandemic in 2020, there were over 4,800 guide dog partnerships and now there are 3,695. More than one in five people who had a guide dog before then now do not.

Appeal - A request to the public for money, information, or help. The Guide Dogs for the Blind Association has launched an appeal for volunteers to help raise and foster guide dogs.

Companion – A person or animal that someone spends a lot of time with. Guide dog users rely on their companions for help inside and outside the home, and for many, for their independence.

Murton Park - Year 4

This week, Year Four visited Murton Park to experience the life of a Roman soldier. Throughout the morning, children dressed up as a Roman soldier, took a tour of a Roman fort, created an oil lamp from clay and practised writing in Latin. They were also treated to a history lesson, reviewing common Roman weapons and territories.

Following a lunch in the barracks, Year Four then undertook weapons training, practising with a range of tools from a short sword, shield to javelins. They even defeated some Celts using the Roman's famous Testudo formation.

Finally, they ended the day by praising the Roman gods and receiving their pay for a hard day's work.

All children behaved well and were a credit to Burlington Junior School.







Plant Visit - Class 9

This half term, Class 9 took part in 'Children Challenging Industry'. This STEM programme consisted of three problem-solving science sessions and a site visit to Saltend Chemicals Park. The children were presented with three potential problems (Leaky Pipes; Filter Fun and Cooling Coils), which have hazardous consequences for the chemical park if not swiftly rectified. Class 9 were fantastic, and displayed very enthusiastic work.

Class winners all received a small prize for their efforts.



Science Week

Last week was British Science Week and our school got involved more than ever before. We all took part in a project linked to the book, 'The Most Important Animal of All'. Our launch included a live online meeting with the books author, Penny Worms, who spoke to the children about why she wrote the book and also read some of it to them live! Throughout the week, Year 3 chose to

study sharks including an online meeting with an expert from The Deep. Y4 studied elephants and Y5 studied tigers- they had a joint online meeting with Chester zoo. Year 6 studied bees and this included an online meeting with the Bumblebee Conservation Trust which they all thoroughly loved. They were all really engaged and produced some excellent work. At the end of the week, each year group presented their learning to the rest of the school during assembly and then we had a whole school vote to find out which animal our pupils thought



was the most important of all. Y3 and sharks won! It really was a fantastic week. We are looking forward to sharing what we learned in a wider way- via Twitter and with other schools- during the Great Science Share in June.
